ACTION REQUESTED

Hold hearing on request for variance and appeal from order of fire inspector

BACKGROUND

In October of 2025, the City's Fire Marshal and Fire Inspector completed a fire code related inspection of Nowhere Haunted House, located at 5300 Robert Trail South, # 300. Based on their observations of certain paneling located in the escape room area of the haunted house, an order identifying a failure to comply with the Minnesota State Fire Code based on the paneling used in that area was issued. The order requires the removal of a portion of the paneling. The owner of the haunted house has appealed that order, requesting a variance from compliance with the fire code provisions related to the paneling. The City Council, along with the Fire Chief who serves as an *ex officio* member, serve as the City's Fire Code Board of Appeals, which is tasked with hearing appeals/requests for variances from the Minnesota State Fire Code. At its May 4th meeting, the City Council voted to hold a hearing and make a determination regarding the requested variance.

The Fire Code Board of Appeals is asked to hold a hearing on the requested variance/appeal.

Hold a hearing and then take action to approve the requested variance/appeal; deny the requested variance/appeal; or endorse the appeal to the State Fire Marshal for a hearing and decision on the requested variance.

Set #4 – Crypt / Enchanted Forest Timeline

June 2022 – Vacuform panels were installed in Set #4 (“Crypt”).

July 2022 – Fire Marshal Phil Owens conducted a walkthrough inspection and informed us of the additional fire safety requirements associated with classification as a “Special Amusement” establishment. No concerns were raised regarding the vacuform panels being non-compliant. In addition, the inspection report stated: “Please read inspection reports in their entirety; failure to do so will not grant immunity if items are not corrected at reinspection.”

September 22, 2022 – Fire safety plans were reviewed, approved, and returned via the city permit portal.

September 30, 2022 – Fire Marshal Phil Owens and members of the fire department conducted a comprehensive walkthrough of all sets, including testing and inspection of all fire safety equipment and emergency exits. No concerns were raised regarding the vacuform panels being non-compliant. In addition, the inspection report stated: “Please read inspection reports in their entirety; failure to do so will not grant immunity if items are not corrected at reinspection.”

September 20, 2023 – Fire Marshal Scott Oswald and Fire Inspector Derek McNamara conducted a walkthrough inspection.

October 3, 2023 – An inspection report was issued identifying the following items for correction:

- Open holes around electrical conduit in the workshop area to be sealed with fire-retardant spray
 - Submission of a specification sheet for the fire-retardant spray used on set materials
- No concerns were raised regarding the vacuform panels being non-compliant. In addition, the inspection report stated: “Please read inspection reports in their entirety; failure to do so will not grant immunity if items are not corrected at reinspection.”

September 4, 2024 – Fire Marshal Scott Oswald and Fire Inspector Derek McNamara conducted a walkthrough inspection.

October 4, 2024 – An inspection report was issued identifying the following items for correction:

- Adjustment of emergency exit doors to ensure ease of opening
 - Replacement of batteries in emergency lighting
 - Replacement of a missing ceiling tile in the break room
 - Replacement of power strips
 - Installation of a cover on an open electrical box
 - Securing hanging acoustical tiles using metal ties instead of plastic
- No concerns were raised regarding the vacuform panels being non-compliant. In addition,

the inspection report stated: “Please read inspection reports in their entirety; failure to do so will not grant immunity if items are not corrected at reinspection.”

September 4, 2025 – Fire Marshal Scott Oswald and Fire Inspector Derek McNamara conducted a walkthrough inspection.

October 9, 2025 – An inspection report (attached) was issued identifying the following items for correction:

- Adjustment of emergency exit doors
- Removal of partial obstructions to means of egress (artificial plant located too close to an exit door)
- Replacement of batteries in emergency lighting
- Replacement of power strips

No concerns were raised regarding the vacuform panels being non-compliant. In addition, the inspection report stated: “Please read inspection reports in their entirety; failure to do so will not grant immunity if items are not corrected at reinspection.”

October 27, 2025 – A follow-up inspection report (attached) reiterated the same items listed above.

No concerns were raised regarding the vacuform panels being non-compliant. In addition, the inspection report stated “Thank you for correcting code deficiencies to make your property safer...”. In addition, the report stated “Next inspection scheduled to be conducted on or after 09/22/2026.”

October 29, 2025 – An unscheduled Property Inspection Result (attached) was provided to us that identified a new requirement without any change in the law:

- Removal of plastic paneling covering the walls in the escape room

October 29, 2025 – We formally challenged the request to remove the vacuform panels. Our challenge is based on the following:

- Multiple reputable vendors manufacture and sell vacuform panels specifically for the haunted house and escape room industry. These vendors regularly exhibit at the annual TransWorld Haunted Attraction & Escape Room Trade Show in St. Louis, Missouri.

The panels have been in place since June 2022, and no prior inspections to October 29, 2025 identified them as a concern. In fact, the prior inspection report on October 27, 2025 stated that the Inspection was “Completed” and that all previous deficiencies had been corrected, and that the next inspection was to be conducted on or after 09/22/2026. In addition, the prior inspection report stated we had immunity for those items had corrected at reinspection. Reinspection occurred on October 27, 2025, and the property fully passed inspection.

Application of Variance Questions/Responses

1. The Property is Substantially in Compliance with the Fire Code (Other than the Variance Issue)

Nowhere Entertainment is a year-round amusement center offering mini golf, arcade games, escape rooms, and seasonal haunted attractions

. We are a family run business that aims to provide enriching, fun activities for individuals to bond with each other and create lasting memories whether it is a fun family outing, a birthday party, or a corporate team building exercise.

Throughout our existence as a business, we have complied with all deficiencies that were completed by proper and valid inspections. In the multiple inspections that we have had, it was emphasized through each Fire Inspection Report that immunity would be granted for items that were not corrected at reinspection. Each Fire Inspection Report clearly stated *“Please read inspection reports in their entirety; failure to do so will not grant immunity if items are not corrected at reinspection.”* Since opening on October 1, 2022, we have consistently complied with all required fire safety protocols and promptly addressed any requested corrections.

Notably, the vacuform panels at issue were not identified as a concern in inspections conducted over the previous three years. In fact, in the most recent inspection on October 9, 2025, the vacuform panels were not identified as a concern nor a code violation. Based on this consistent history, we believe it is reasonable to conclude that enforcement of this requirement should not be applied retroactively in this instance.

Additionally, the October 27, 2026 Fire Inspection Report clearly showed that our business had passed the inspection. The Report stated: “Thank you for correcting code deficiencies to make your property safer...”. Moreover, the Report stated “Next inspection scheduled to be conducted on or after 09/22/2026.” Instead of following its own Report and the conclusions of the Report, the City arbitrarily decided to conduct another alleged inspection on October 29, 2026 when it failed our business for the vacuform panels.

Due to our objection to the October 29, 2026 arbitrary Fire Inspection Report, an additional site visit was conducted with representatives from the Fire Department (Scott Oswald and Derek McNamara) and the City Inspection Team (Steve Johnson and Luke Steenberg). During this visit, we provided video evidence demonstrating that the vacuform panels have been in place since our opening in 2022 and had never previously been identified as non-compliant.

During the discussion, Scott Oswald sought input from Steve Johnson, who indicated that, given the panels have been in place since opening and were never previously cited, they should not

now be considered a violation. (This statement is paraphrased but accurately reflects the substance of his feedback.)

2. The Safety of the Public and Building Occupants Will Not Be Jeopardized (Including Responding Firefighters)

We are confident that the use of vacuform panels does not pose any risk to public safety. These panels have been in use for over 20 years in similar establishments without any reported fire safety incidents. Additionally, there are never more than eight customers in the set at one time, and the building is equipped with an approved sprinkler system as well as two accessible exits, each within 30 feet of the building's exterior.

3. Undue Hardship Will Result to the Requesting Party Unless the Variance Is Granted

As a small family-owned business, each dollar that we spend matters a great deal to our bottom line. Since 2022, we have invested more than \$9,500 in the incorporation of the vacuform panels in our family friendly, team-building, memory enhancing space.

The vacuform panels are currently an integral part of the immersive experience attendees encounter in our space and it is crucial to the success of our haunted house and escape rooms. Our customers expect a fully realistic environment, which is achieved through the use of vacuform panels. Without these panels, we would be forced to close the escape room and hire a set designer to manually recreate the experience, which would be both cost-prohibitive and time-consuming. There is currently no cost-effective alternative to replicate the realism that these panels provide. The potential lost revenue is approximately \$12,000, in addition to an estimated \$10,000-\$15,000 for demolition and reconstruction.

We are a small, family-owned business working very hard to establish ourselves. We love the Inver Grove Heights community and feel honored to share in numerous memorable moments within our center. Nowhere Entertainment is growing each year, but it's a painstaking process. We have a tight budget. Shutting down one sixth or our sets and a very popular escape room would cause undue hardship.

4. A Good Faith Effort Has Been/Is Being Made to Correct All Violations Cited

We have always complied with every request made by the Fire Department or City Inspectors Office in a timely manner. We have acted in good faith, and relied on the statements and inspection reports created by the city.

5. The Granting of a Time Extension is an Acceptable Risk for the Property Occupants

Granting an extension would not resolve the core issue, as the vacuform panels are integral to creating the immersive experience necessary for our haunted house and escape room to be successful. If the appeal is not granted, we respectfully request an extension until August 2027, which aligns with the expiration of our lease. While the alternative we propose is not what we

want, at least it allows us to minimize the hardship that we would endure if the vacuform panels are required to be replaced at this time.

6. Undue Hardship Will Result to the Requesting Party Unless the Time Extension Is Granted

We are a small, locally owned business that has invested substantial financial resources, time, and personal commitment to create a unique, safe, and welcoming destination for the Inver Grove Heights community. What we have built is more than a business—it's a place for families, friends, workgroups, and classmates to gather and create memories as they experience interactive activities, custom designed private events, celebrations and Nowhere Entertainment's own free community events throughout the year.

Since opening, we have grown to serve more than 8,000 subscribed community members and have hosted hundreds of events. We have consistently demonstrated our commitment not only to compliance, but to community enrichment. Each year, we provide free seasonal events, including Easter celebrations where children can meet the Easter Bunny, enjoy face painting, and receive gifts, as well as Christmas events featuring Santa and his elf. These events are offered at no cost to families and are designed to ensure that all members of the community—regardless of means—can participate.

Our commitment to the community extends further through charitable partnerships. Most recently, we collaborated with Neighbors, Inc. on the "Escape Hunger" initiative, during which local mayors from Inver Grove Heights, Mendota Heights, South St. Paul, and West St. Paul volunteered to be locked in an escape room. Community donations were used to provide clues for their release, resulting in more than \$5,500 raised for a local food shelf serving families in need. This event reflects the type of meaningful, community-centered engagement we strive to provide.

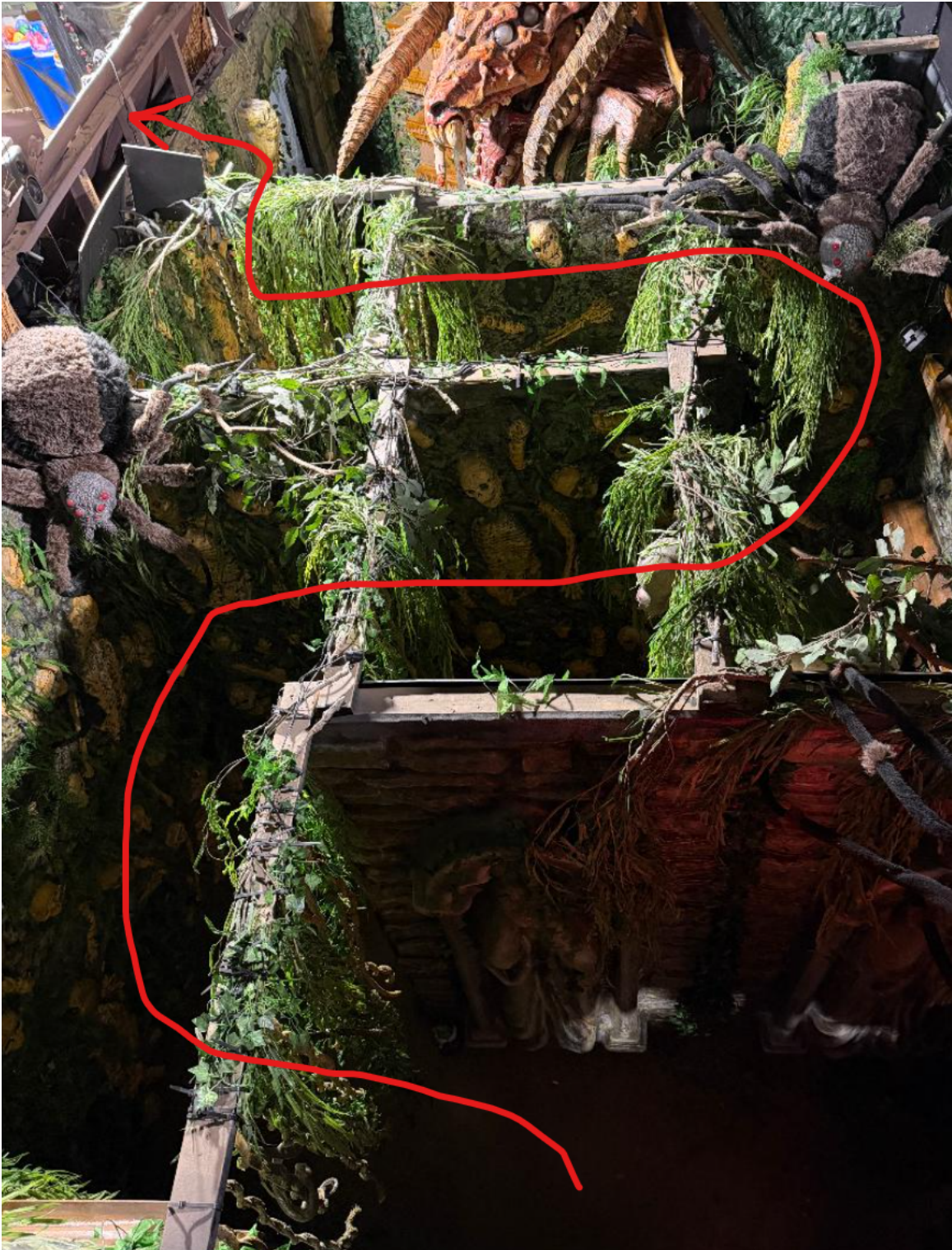
Requiring the removal of the vacuform panels would impose a significant and undue hardship on our business. The escape room attraction—one of our primary offerings—would be forced to close entirely. Any attempt to recreate a comparable experience would necessitate hiring a professional set designer and undertaking extensive reconstruction. Such efforts would be both cost-prohibitive and time-intensive, with no reasonable assurance of achieving a similar result. At present, there is no feasible or economically viable alternative that would replicate the existing installation.

The financial burden alone is substantial, including an estimated \$12,000 in lost revenue, in addition to \$10,000–\$15,000 in demolition and reconstruction costs. For a small business, these costs are not merely inconvenient - they are materially impactful and threaten the continued viability of a key component of our operations.

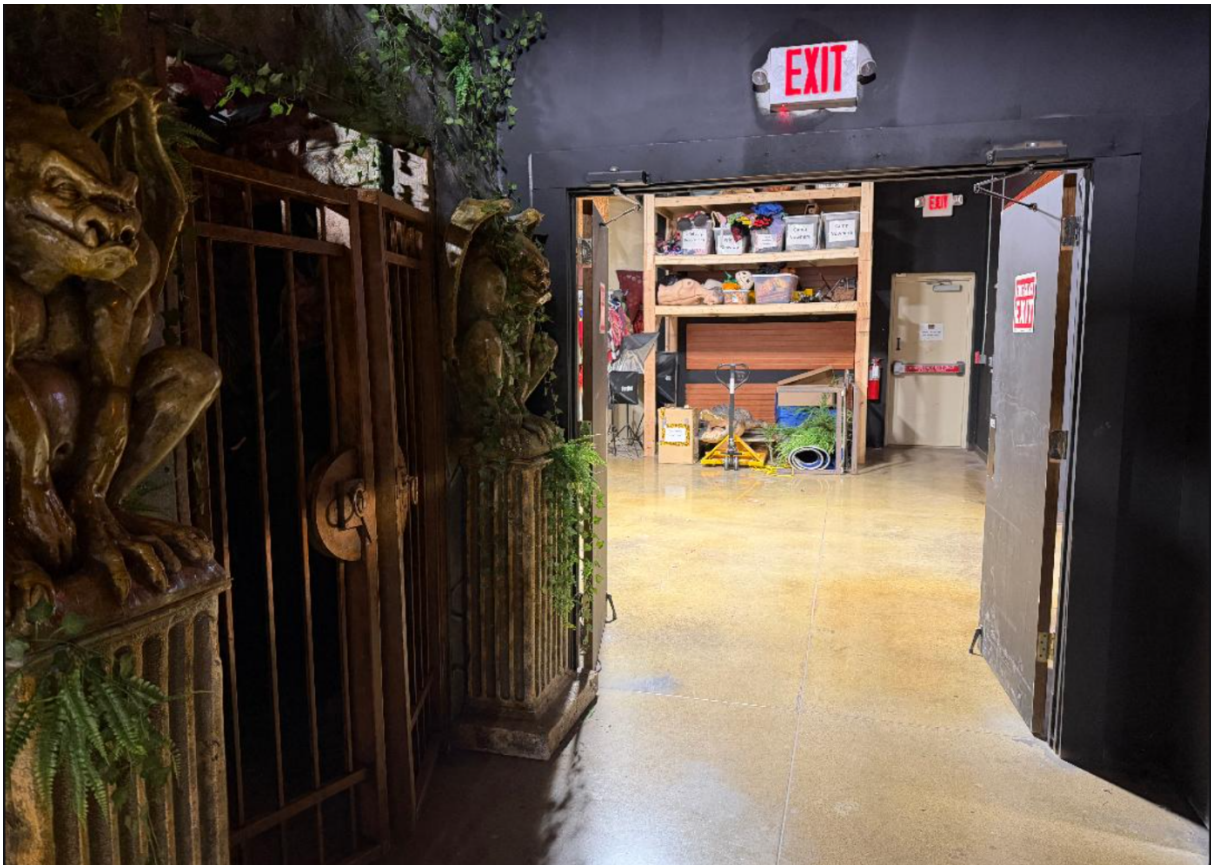
Moreover, this hardship is compounded by the fact that the panels have been in place since our opening and were not previously identified as non-compliant in prior inspections – including a previous inspection conducted that same month.

For these reasons, we respectfully submit that strict enforcement of this requirement, under these specific facts, results in an undue hardship that is both significant and avoidable. We therefore respectfully request immunity from the fire code regulation restricting the use of vacuform panels, or such relief as deemed appropriate, so that we may continue to operate safely while serving and supporting our community.

ACTION REQUESTED

Take action on appeal/variance from order of fire inspector.

BACKGROUND

The Fire Code Board of Appeals is asked to take action on the appeal and request for variance from the fire inspector's order to remove the plastic paneling covering the walls in the escape house area of Nowhere Haunted House. The Board has three options:

1. Grant the request for a variance/appeal and allow some or all of the plastic paneling to remain on the walls of the escape house, with or without conditions.
2. Deny the request for a variance/appeal and order compliance with the Fire Inspector's order within a specific period of time.
3. Choose to take no action and endorse the matter to the State Fire Marshal to hear the appeal/request for variance.

Three resolutions have been included in the packet, one approving the variance/appeal, one denying the appeal, and one taking no action and endorsing the matter to the State Fire Marshal to hear the appeal/request for variance. The Board should make a motion to approve one of the attached resolutions, with any changes or additional language as the Board sees fit, or if the Board determines it would be in the City's best interest to have this decision made by the State Fire Marshall, the Board can make a motion to take no action on the variance and endorse the matter to the State Fire Marshal to ear the appeal/request for variance.

**A RESOLUTION GRANTING APPEAL AND REQUEST FOR VARIANCE FROM
ORDER OF FIRE INSPECTOR**

WHEREAS, the Inver Grove Heights Fire Marshal and Fire Inspector completed a property inspection for the property located at 5300 South Robert Trail, # 300, which is operated as Nowhere Haunted House; and

WHEREAS, following that inspection, the Fire Inspector issued a “failed” inspection report to Nowhere Haunted House that required the plastic paneling in the escape house area of the property to be removed due to its noncompliance with certain provisions of the Minnesota State Fire Code; and

WHEREAS, the operator of Nowhere Haunted House has submitted an appeal and request for variance related to this property inspection to allow the plastic paneling to remain on the walls in the escape house; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes Section 299F.011, the City of Inver Grove Heights has established a fire code Board of Appeals, consisting of the City Council, with the fire chief serving as an *ex officio* member, as detailed in subd. 5a, Inver Grove Heights City Code Section 9-2-6; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Appeals is charged with considering issues related to requests for variances from orders issued under the code; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Appeals met and, following a hearing, has made the following decision regarding the appeal and request for variance based on all of the information included in the meeting agenda and all of the information presented at that meeting.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY OF INVER GROVE HEIGHTS
FIRE CODE BOARD OF APPEALS AS FOLLOWS:**

1. The appeal and request for a variance from the order of the Fire Inspector is hereby **GRANTED** based on the following **FINDINGS OF FACT**:
2.
 - a. While the plastic paneling covering the walls in the escape house does not comply with Minnesota State Fire Code requirements as detailed in the Inver Grove Heights Fire Department Property Inspection Report prepared by Fire Inspector Derek McNamara on October 29, 2025, taking into consideration the benefit to be obtained by complying with the fire marshal's orders and the effect on affordable housing, the

spirit of the code, and securing public safety, the Board of Appeals finds that sufficient grounds exist to warrant granting a variance from the applicable Minnesota State Fire Code standards to allow the plastic paneling to remain in the escape house.

b. The Council further finds that:

- i. The property is substantially in compliance with the fire code and there are no outstanding fire code compliance issues other than the paneling issue.
- ii. The safety of the public and building occupants will not be jeopardized by allowing the plastic paneling to remain. The remainder of the premises is in compliance with the fire code, and the fire suppression, emergency lighting, and other systems installed on the premises protect the safety of the public and building occupants.
- iii. The business will suffer an undue hardship unless the variance is granted due to the substantial cost to remove and replace the plastic paneling.

- 3. The variance is approved only as to the plastic paneling installed in the escape house as of October 29, 2025. This variance does not allow the installation of any additional plastic paneling that is not in compliance with the Minnesota State Fire Code.
- 4. This is the final decision of the Inver Grove Heights Fire Code Board of Appeals regarding this appeal and variance request.

WHEREAS, the Inver Grove Heights Fire Marshal and Fire Inspector completed a property inspection for the property located at 5300 South Robert Trail, # 300, which is operated as Nowhere Haunted House; and

WHEREAS, following that inspection, the Fire Inspector issued a “failed” inspection report to Nowhere Haunted House that required the plastic paneling in the escape house area of the property to be removed due to its noncompliance with certain provisions of the Minnesota State Fire Code; and

WHEREAS, the operator of Nowhere Haunted House has submitted an appeal and request for variance related to this property inspection to allow the plastic paneling to remain on the walls in the escape house; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Appeals is charged with considering issues related to requests for variances from orders issued under the code; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Appeals met and, following a hearing, has made the following decision regarding the appeal and request for variance based on all of the information included in the meeting agenda and all of the information presented at that meeting.

 - a. The plastic paneling covering the walls in the escape house does not comply with Minnesota State Fire Code requirements as detailed in the Inver Grove Heights Fire Department Property Inspection Report prepared by Fire Inspector Derek McNamara on October 29, 2025.

Having taken into consideration the benefit to be obtained by complying with the fire marshal's orders and the effect on affordable housing, the spirit of the code, and securing public safety, the Board of Appeals finds that sufficient grounds do not exist to warrant granting a variance from the applicable Minnesota State Fire Code standards to allow the plastic paneling to remain in the escape house.
- 3. Nowhere Haunted House is ordered to bring its premises into full compliance with the Minnesota State Fire Code and the October 29, 2025 Fire Inspector's Order and remove the plastic paneling covering the walls in the escape house by _____.
- 4. This final decision of the Inver Grove Heights Fire Code Board of Appeals may be appealed to the State Fire Marshall as provided in Minnesota Statutes, Section 299F.011, subd. 5.
